Winner! Holy Cross Cemetery Recognized Nationally for Excellence



memorial Mass for departed clergy lead by Cardinal Joseph William Tobin, C.Ss.R., Archbishop of Newark, was celebrated on November 8, 2017, in the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart. Bishops, clergy, seminarians, bereavement facilitators, members of the Knights of Columbus, parishioners and family members of departed clergy attended the service. Following Holy Communion, the names of 14 Archdiocesan priests who died in the past year were announced as fellow clergy or family members carried a white rose for each departed priest to the Altar.

"Taking part in today's celebration of Mass and receiving the Eucharist is truly a blessing... it is powerful healing medicine, especially at a time of loss and grief," said Andrew P. Schafer, Executive Director of Catholic Cemeteries, a ministry of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Newark, which hosted the remembrance Mass. "We are deeply grateful to our dearly departed clergy for praying over us, with us, and for us, and for their sacrifices and love. May they know that they were loved in return."

Local Pastor Concelebrates Canonization Mass with Pope Francis; Honors Italian Capuchin Priest, Saint Angelo d'Acri

Reverend Joseph Ferraro, pastor of the Holy Family Church in Nutley, New Jersey, traveled to the Vatican in October to concelebrate Mass in St. Peter's Square with Pope Francis where 35 new saints were canonized.

Father Joe was particularly excited to celebrate the canonization of Saint Angelo of Acri, an Italian Capuchin priest from Father Joe's Italian hometown of Acri, Calabria.

"Growing up from a very early age, I remember my parents and grandparents speaking of Blessed Angelo of Acri," said Father Joe. "They all had pictures, calendars and various religious articles at home and spoke of the life of this great saint and the hope and prayers for his canonization as a Saint."

Saint Angelo was born Luca Antonio Falcone on October 19, 1669, and became a Capuchin Franciscan at age 18. He professed vows in 1691, took the name "Angelo," and dedicated himself to preaching.

Saint Angelo preached mainly in Calabria and Naples and converted

thousands while performing numerous healing miracles. He was believed to have the gifts of prophecy and bilocation, simultaneous presence in two different places, similar to Padre Pio. He also was known to experience visions and ecstasies.

Saint Angelo died in Acri on October 30, 1739, and was beatified by Pope Leo XII in 1825. His feast day is October 30th.

Father Joe recounts how the pilgrims who visited the Vatican Mass for Saint Angelo wore yellow caps depicting the Saint and his Basilica in Acri. As the Saint's name was announced, the pilgrims waved banners with messages to Pope Francis, "Calabria loves you," while they chanted, "Evivva Sant'Angelo d'Acri!"

"The square was full of joy and life," described Father Joe. "There were many tears of joy, as the people of Acri have waited so long for this moment. I thought about my grandparents and other extended family members who waited for this day but now are home with the Lord as they joyfully celebrated with us at this Mass."

Upon his return home, Father Joe celebrated a monthly Mass of Remembrance at Holy Cross Cemetery in North Arlington on November 8 followed by a blessing of a beautiful mosaic of Saint Angelo in honor of the canonization. Specially-designed Saint Angelo prayer cards printed in English and Italian were distributed at Mass and are still available at Holy Cross Cemetery. For more information, call 888-467-8903. The Catholic Way: The Order of Christian Funerals



The Catholic funeral rite is divided into three parts: the Vigil (Wake), the Funeral Mass, and the Rite of Committal.

These meaningful Church rituals guide our Catholic family at the time of loss.

If cremation is chosen as the body's final disposition, cremation should take place after the Funeral Mass since funeral rites are designed to be celebrated in the body's presence.

Selecting a Final Resting Place

Catholic Cemeteries offers a variety of memorial options for the interment of cremated remains in our beautiful, inviting and faith-filled atmosphere.

- Glass Front Niches Elegant above-ground urn spaces with see-through beveled glass fronts located inside our magnificent chapel mausoleums.
- ◆ Granite/Marble Front Niches Interior or exterior above-ground urn spaces with bold, raised, bronze lettering.
- Cremation Graves In-ground burial specifically for cremated remains utilizing a cemetery approved outer burial container.
- Right of an Inurnment If space allows, an additional interment right into an existing grave or crypt may be acquired with cemetery approval and



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owner consent.



Cemetery Beautification Schedule

In order to preserve the beauty of our cemeteries year-round, general clean-up days are scheduled quarterly to remove holiday ornaments and decorations from graves and mausoleums. Due to the volume of removed

decorations, it is not possible to claim items after removal. Therefore, any items families wish to keep must be collected prior to scheduled clean up dates.
